

# CONNECTING GOOGLE SCHOLAR TO THE LIBRARY DATABASES

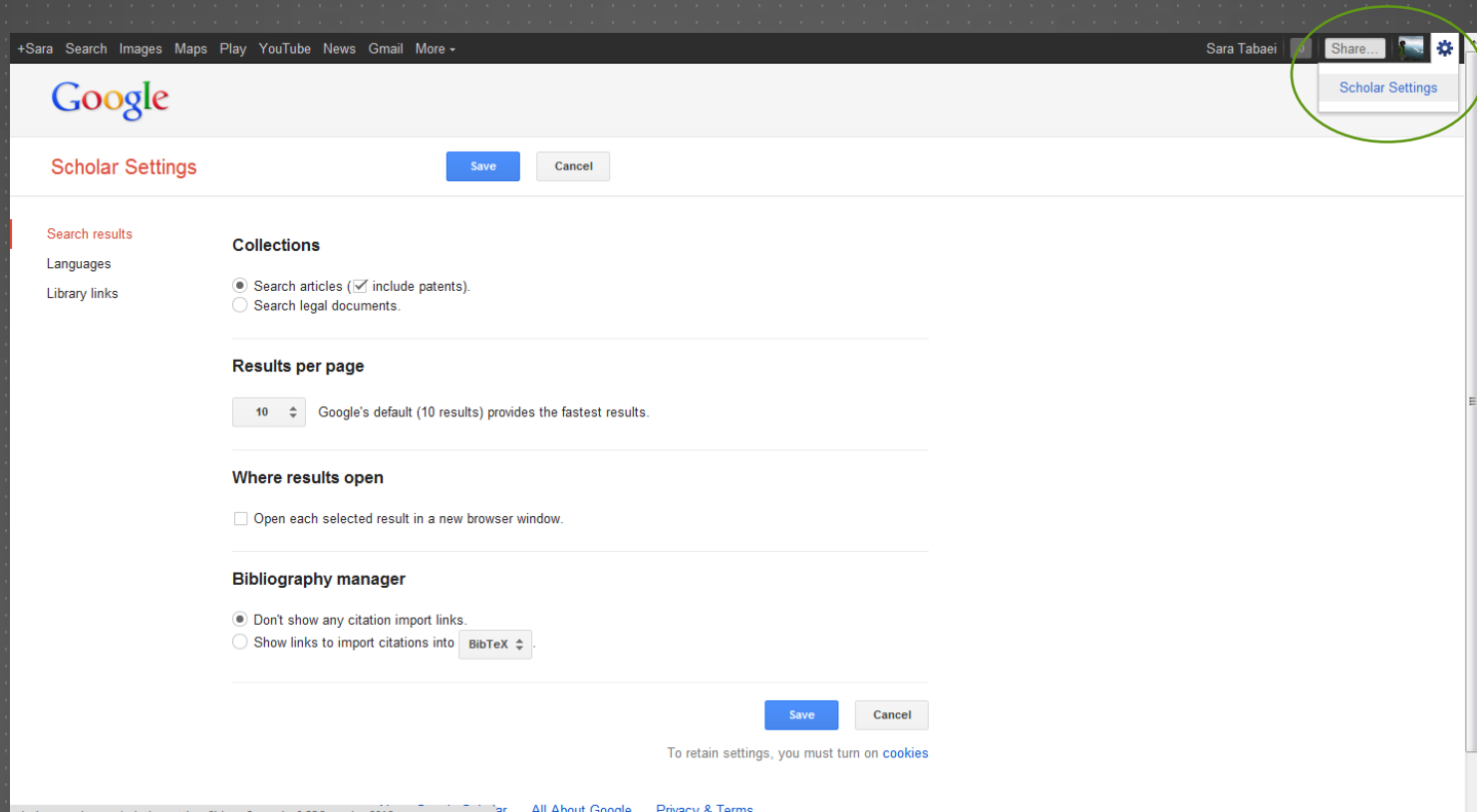
## How to connect Google Scholar to the library databases

- ▶ If you find an article in Google Scholar but it is not in full-text, never pay for the article!
- ▶ If you set the settings of Google Scholar on your computer to “Touro Consortium”, you can access many of the results via the library databases in full-text format for free. HOW?


# GOOGLE SCHOLAR AND THE LIBRARY

- ▶ Go to the Scholar Settings on the right hand corner of the page and click on Library Links on the left hand.
- ▶ Then type Touro Consortium in the search box.
- ▶ Click on the “Find Library” Button and then Save.



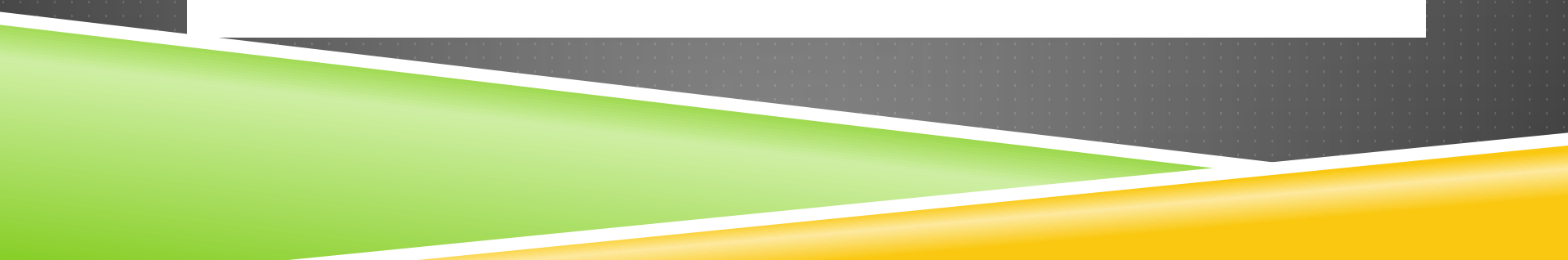

- ▶ Now, if you see the phrase '[Full-Text @ My Library](#)' next to the results of your search, it means that Touro library owns the full-text version of the article and by clicking on the link, you will be guided to it directly.
- ▶ If you still cannot get the article in full-text, you may get the article via an Interlibrary loan! ASK a LIBRARIAN.
- ▶ Note: You still need to log in to the library in order to access the full-text articles, if you are off-campus.
